#### FIRST PEOPLES' ASSEMBLY ELDERS

Aboriginal Elders from across Victoria have been selected for an historic Elders' Voice group to help guide the First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria towards Treaty negotiations. With gender and geographic representation, the 20 Elders were selected to become the Elders' Voice Standing Group due to their experience, wisdom and standing in Community, following an open process. These respected Elders will provide wisdom and cultural authority on the journey to Treaty as the Assembly begins negotiating a statewide Treaty with the Victorian

#### YOORROOK JUSTICE COMMISSION

The Yoorrook Justice Commissioners acknowledged the Victorian Government's response to the Yoorrook for Justice Report, with 28 recommendations being accepted in full or in principle. Agreement on these recommendations demonstrates the importance and effectiveness of truth telling. Commissioners expect to see progress on the 15 recommendations under consideration in the months to come. There are 46 recommendations in the Report after a year-long inquiry into systemic injustice within Victoria's child protection and criminal justice systems, finding both systems remain broken for First Peoples, and that the presentday failures of these systems are deeply rooted in the colonial foundations of the state. First Peoples' Assembly Co-Chair Ngarra Murray said she was frustrated by how long the government had taken to respond and disappointed about the disrespect shown to Community members who participated in the truth-telling process.

#### SOUTH AUSTRALIA'S VOICE IMPLEMENTED

The Government of South Australia has committed to a state-based implementation of the Uluru Statement from the Heart - Voice, Treaty and Truth, commencing with the South Australian First Nations Voice to Parliament, following elections held in March. This is different to the federal Voice and only relates to SA. The SA Voice will be a direct and independent line of communication for First Nations People to SA's parliament and government, made up of six local First Nations Voices and a state First Nations Voice. <a href="https://www.agd.sa.gov.au/first-nations-voice">https://www.agd.sa.gov.au/first-nations-voice</a>

#### **NEW CHILDREN'S COMMISSIONER**

The government will establish a National Commissioner dedicated to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children and families to help address critical issues facing First Nations youth. Recognised by SNAICC

CEO Catherine Liddle as a transformative initiative, this new role promises to advocate for systemic changes that are deeply needed to ensure First Nations children can grow up in environments where they are safe, respected and connected to their cultural heritage.

#### JUNE OSCAR'S LEGACY

June Oscar's term as Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Social Justice Commissioner ended in March. The first woman to hold the position, her legacy continues in the way she has amplified the voices of First Nations women and girls. June travelled around the country, listening to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women for the Wiyi Yani U Thangani - 'Women's Voices' in Bunuba language - which continues as the Wiyi Yani U Thangani Institute for First Nations Gender Justice

at the ANU, supported with a \$3 million grant over four years.



June Oscar AO has completed her term as Social Justice Commissioner.

#### **RECONCILIATION STONNINGTON**

Our group will have an information table at City of Stonnington's Reconciliation Week that includes a Welcome to Country by a Wurundjeri Elder and entertainment from by John Wayne Parsons, proud Yugerra and Ugarem Le man, Tuesday 21 May, 2.00 pm, Malvern Town Hall. We returned to Prahran Place for our April meeting, and inspired by our visit to Murnong First Peoples Gathering Place, changed the seating arrangement to a yarning circle. We had a rich conversation about how the Reconciliation process could benefit from non-Indigenous people reckoning with their culture and history; how it has shaped their behaviour, values and ultimately interactions with First Peoples. As part of Reconciliation Stonnington's commitment in 2024 to deepen our cultural understanding and build relationships, we have booked Koorie Heritage Trust's Birrarung Wilam Walking Tour for early May. #### **RECONCILIATION NEWS**

Reconciliation Victoria (RV) hosted 20 Reconciliation leaders at the Australian Reconciliation Network (ARN) in Naarm at the Koorie Heritage Trust last month. Discussions focused on the next steps for Australia's Reconciliation journey, how to collectively support truth telling, influence societal change, push for justice, advocate for Treaties, increase Reconciliation awareness and erase racism. #### REFERENDUM FUNDING STATISTICS

Data released by the Australian Electoral Commission show a spending and donations gulf between the two sides of the Voice to Parliament referendum. Yes campaign organisations received millions more in donations than their No counterparts, with equivalent results in their spending. Australians for Constitutional

Recognition, the main Yes campaign body, received more than \$40 million in donations; the closest No campaign rival, Australians for Unity, received more than \$10 million in donations, ultimately spending almost \$12 million. Combined with Advance Australia, the other prominent No campaign, some \$22 million was spent advocating against the Voice, less than half the \$53 million spent by the major Yes campaigns. The data, however, doesn't provide a full picture of donations.

#### **ILF'S PRESTIGIOUS AWARD**

The Indigenous Literacy Foundation (ILF) won this year's Astrid Lindgren Memorial Award, receiving \$725,000.

"In close collaboration with Communities, they highlight the value of all people's own languages and stories. By spreading books and stimulating reading, storytelling and creativity, Indigenous Literacy Foundation builds the desire to read and fosters pride, self-confidence and a sense of belonging. Every child has the right to their language and their stories."

#### **CHILD BAIL REFORMS**

In March, Victorian Attorney General Jaclyn Symes announced the government would not go ahead with plans to implement a presumption of bail for children, claiming the reform was not needed. She said "99%" of children accused of crimes were granted bail, as they were able to demonstrate to the courts exceptional circumstances or compelling reasons why they should not be put into custody. "If that's what's happening in practice, changing it and creating concern that we are weakening bail, when it's not necessarily the case, is not something that we need to do", she said.

#### **OLDEST ABORIGINAL POTTERY UNCOVERED**

Scientists have uncovered close to 100 small pieces of pottery on Jiigurru (Lizard Island) that are dated to between 3,000 and 1,800 years old. The pottery may have been made locally by First Nations People, making it the oldest - and one of the only - examples of Aboriginal pottery, made thousands of years before European colonisation. Experts agree more archaeology in the area needs to be carried out.
